PROFILE OF SPEAKERS and WORKSHOP MODERATORS

In this issue we profile some more people who will be participating at the EUFAMI Congress in September - Professor Patrick Corrigan, Dr. Matt Muijen and Spyros Zorbas.

Professor Patrick Corrigan

Patrick Corrigan is Distinguished Professor and Associate Dean for Research in the College of Psychology at the Illinois Institute of Technology. He was formerly Professor of Psychiatry and Executive Director of the Center for Psychiatric Rehabilitation at the University of Chicago. Professor Corrigan is a licensed clinical psychologist setting up and providing services for people with serious mental illnesses and their families for more than 30 years. He is principal investigator of the National Consortium on Stigma and Empowerment (NCSE), previously known as the Chicago Consortium for Stigma Research, the only NIMH-funded research center examining the stigma of mental illness. Central to NCSE is the Center on Adherence and Self-Determination (CASD).



One recent study supported by NIAAA, NIMH, and The Fogarty Center examined mental illness stigma endorsed by employers in Beijing, Chicago, and Hong Kong. Lately, Professor Corrigan has partnered with colleagues from the Department for Veteran Affairs and Department of Defense to develop and evaluate anti-stigma programs to help personnel returning from Iraq and Afghanistan, and veterans, seek out services for Post Traumatic Stress and other Disorders. He is a prolific researcher having published eleven books and more than 250 papers and is editor of the *American Journal of Psychiatric Rehabilitation*

Professor Corrigan will be presenting on the first day of the congress on the topic of '*Stigma and Social Inclusion*'.

Dr. Matt Muijen MD PhD

Matt Muijen is the Regional Adviser for Mental Health at the WHO Regional Office for Europe. He is responsible for planning and coordinating mental health policies and strategies, research, dissemination and implementation in the Region. His present priority is the delivery of the mental health declaration and action plan for Europe, endorsed by all European member states in Helsinki.



Until April 2004 he was Chief Executive of the Sainsbury Centre for Mental Health in London for 12 years, an organisation strongly involved with mental health care reforms in the UK.

His background is a community psychiatrist and epidemiologist, and he trained in Cambridge and the Institute of Psychiatry in London. He is Dutch, and studied Medicine in Amsterdam.

Matt Muijen will deliver the Keynote address on the first day of the Congress and his talk is entitled '*Introduction to Community Care in Europe*'.

Mr Spyros Zorbas



Spyros Zorbas was born in Athens in 1976. He has a Certificate in Special Education from the University of the Aegean, a Professional Certificate in Counselling Skills, an M.Sc. in Electronic Commerce from the University of Kingston and a Bachelor's degree in Economics from the University of Piraeus.

He is currently working on getting his Master's degree in Special Needs from the University of Nottingham in the UK.

In 2007 Spyros developed the association KINAPSI. KINAPSI is a member of EUFAMI and an NGO which helps siblings of people suffering from mental illness (www.kinapsi.gr). He works voluntarily to organise support groups and workshops where guest speakers share their perspective about mental health, he has been running support groups for adults with ADHD in Greece since 2008. (www.addingreek.com). Spyros Zorbas brings his own personal experience to these meetings, as he is living with ADHD himself and has a sibling who is affected by schizophrenia. He has appeared in the Greek media to speak about both causes.

Spyros will moderate the workshop '*Future implications for Families and Carers*' on the second day of the Congress.

HOW TO REGISTER

Registration is by online process. You can register by logging on to the EUFAMI website and clicking onto the Congress advertisement of the front page (www.eufami.org) and follow the instructions. You may also register by logging onto the registration system by logging onto <https://hotel.basel.com/eufami>. There are three language options to choose from – English, French or German.

When you have submitted your registration, a confirmation email will be sent to the email address entered into the system. Please also ensure that you transfer the appropriate delegate fee as set out above. **Registration will not be complete until the delegate fee has been received into the Congress Account.**

DELEGATE REGISTRATION – CLOSING DATE

Delegate registration will remain open until the 31st August. From the 1st September, delegate registration will be closed.

WORKSHOPS

Interactive workshops will be an integral and important part of the Congress programme. As you will see from the Congress programme, printed on pages 4 and 5 of this Newsletter, two sets of concurrent workshops will take place at the Congress; the first set will be on Saturday, 24th September (the first day) and the second set on Sunday, 25th September (the second day).

In order to give the registered delegates an opportunity to decide which workshops they would wish to attend, we will mail out to all delegates who will have registered delegates on or before the 15th August, requesting that they indicate to us, by return email, their first and second preferences of the workshops they would like to attend. We will then allocate as best as possible the delegates' first preferences based on availability of space in the various workshop rooms at the Congress venue.

So in order to ensure that as many delegates as possible are allocated their first preference, it is recommended that, if you intend to be a delegate at the Congress, you register before the 15th August.

We cannot guarantee that we will be able accommodate those delegates who register after the 15th August with your first preference of workshops, although every effort will be made to do so.

Social and Cultural activities in Basel

In this issue we are featuring some aspects of the social and cultural side of Basel, which hopefully may be of interest to those Congress delegates who plan to stay for a few extra days in Basel.

Guided walking tour of the city – book your place NOW

This will be your opportunity to go on a guided walking tour of the city on either Friday, 23rd or Sunday, 25th September. Travel through time as you explore Basel on foot. In few other cities you will find buildings dating back to the 15th century contrasting with and yet complementing the modern works of internationally renowned architects. Basel's Old Town remains as untouched and beautiful as any other in Europe. Pay a visit to the City Hall in the centre of town – a striking red sandstone building with a prominent tower and colourful murals.

Basel Tourismus will book one guided tour on Friday, 23rd September from 18:00 until 20:00 and a second guided tour on Sunday, 25th September from 18:00 until 20:00.

Delegates to the Congress who are interested in participating in either of these tours can contact Basel Tourismus via E-Mail (incoming@basel.com) indicating their name(s) and date they would like to attend the tour. The minimum attendance is 15 people per tour. With an attendance of 15 people, the price is CHF 25.00 per person. On 9th September 2011 Basel Tourismus will decide, based on the numbers booked at that time, if the tours will take place or not. If the tours will take place, Basel Tourismus will contact those who have booked regarding payment (credit card details).

Basel Museums - A lot to see in such a small city



Basel is very proud of its many museums. No other European city has so many top museums in such a small space. 37 square kilometres for almost 40 museums! The range of collections presented is very broad, but the focus is on fine art.

A collector's passion

Collecting art is a tradition of long standing in Basel. Basel was the first European city making accessible to the public and art collection in 1661. Other treasures of today's Kunstmuseum are pictures by Hans Holbein or modern classics. Apart from the Kunstmuseum, four other state run museums set the standard for many international museums with regard to research and education: The Historisches Museum Basel (Museum of History), the Museum der Kulturen (Museum of cultures), the Antikenmuseum (Museum of antiquity) and the Naturhistorisches Museum (Museum of natural history).

Famous private collections

During the last two decades, some private institutions such as the Fondation Beyeler (1997), the Museum Tinguely (1996) and the Schaulager (2003) have made Basel even more attractive. Especially Fondation Beyeler in Riehen, a suburb of Basel, repeatedly stages very attractive exhibitions and events: A few years ago, the museum had Christo and Jeanne Claude wrap the trees around the building. The special exhibitions of classical modern art are regular highlights in Basel. Last, but not least, the Vitra design collection in Weil am Rhein sets many trends in design and architecture.

Unique and bizarre

Let's not forget the many smaller, quaint and often quite humorous museums that harbour real treasures and intriguing little bits and pieces. The Museum of Pharmaceutical History hosts the largest collection of pharmaceutical history – which is often mysterious and sometimes a little gruesome. The oldest proven exhibit for medical students is a skeleton dating from 1543. It can be seen in the Museum of Anatomy. The Cartoon Museum shows collections of satirical drawings and cartoons. And the Museum of Dolls Houses is home to the world's largest collection of teddy bears.

Theatre is alive in Basel

Apart from the main Theatre Basel, there are 25 small theatre groups of all types and genres.

Theatre Basel

The Theatre Basel is the centre piece of theatre life in Basel. It is run as a threefold stage, with some thirty opera, drama, and ballet productions a year. In order to build a new central stage, a private group of theatre-loving ladies collected the funds needed. In 2002, the new Schauspielhaus was opened, so that Theatre Basel has now three stages to perform.



Fringe Theatres

There are around 25 other theatres of various sizes in Basel. Among them the [Kaserne](#), several children's and young people's theatres, the dialect theatres of Fauteuil and Hábse Theatre, the Vorstadt Theatre, a puppet theatre and a whole range of free theatre companies. Big events are regularly staged at the Musical Theatre in Basel.

Guest Performances

The Theatre Basel regularly invites foreign theatre companies for guest performances. And so does the Musical Theatre Basel, where big shows are staged and the festival "Basel tanzt" is held every year.

Location of the city

The canton of Basel-Stadt lies on the Upper Rhine, in the triangle formed by neighbouring France to the west and Germany to the north. Basel is the main city of Switzerland's northwestern region and forms the bridgehead from German-speaking Switzerland to the European Union. Topographically, Basel has the lowest altitude of all Swiss cities north of the Alps. The 'Dreiländereck' (the triangle formed by Switzerland, France, and Germany) is at 244 meters above sea level.

The city covers an area of 37 square kilometres on both sides of the Rhine, embedded in the triangle between the Swiss Jura, Black Forest (Germany), and Vosges mountains (France). As it passes through Basel, the Rhine bends sharply northward and, becomes much wider as it flows into the Upper Rhine Plain. Basel is a traditional traffic junction. The city lies at the crossroads of the north-south and east-west rail systems; its EuroAirport Basel-Mulhouse-Freiburg provides connections to the European and international airline network.

Access to the city
